Our 10 year old with dyslexia no longer fears reading out loud in class. Ruby's curriculum is exactly what experts use to teach dyslexic children to read, so we no longer need to pay an after-school tutor. And now he's reading novels. Out loud. To anyone/any dog who'll listen!

We choose to give above and beyond our tuition dollars because we see how effective the school is at inspiring the kids to learn, to care for each other, and to give back. We believe in supporting the things that make this world a better place. And MSO is doing just that!
