## **Montessori Feature: Peace Through Education**

Peace Education is often inextricably linked with Montessori education. We place an emphasis on Peace in our curriculum, but not in the way most people think. In fact, many Montessori educators have replaced the term "Peace Education" with "Peace through Education".

The addition of the preposition "through" may seem like a small change, but it is vast in terms of meaning. Peace Education is direct instruction. It implies that we teach Peace by telling our students how to achieve it. This is not something Montessori teachers claim to do. There is no three-period lesson that teaches the Golden Rule. We know, because we are Montessorians, that the work of becoming peaceful has to come from within the child. In other words, Peace, like education, is a process.

In her classroom, Lower Elementary teacher Liz Cossairt has a book titled *Peace Begins with Me*. This is the central teaching of Peace through Education, whether you are a child or an adult. Perhaps more so for us adults! We cannot expect children to be peaceful if we are not. When we set out to achieve peace, the place we must begin is with ourselves. If you're wondering where to start, ask yourself:

- How do I feel when I am peaceful?
- What are the things/actions that make me feel this way?
- Where are my peaceful places?

Being mindful of your exploration and understanding of these questions is essential to helping children when it comes to their peaceful explorations and understandings. The holiday season, when the phrase "Peace on Earth" is on the tip of everyone's tongue, is a reminder to reflect on the ways in which we are modeling peace for the children in our lives.
