Classroom Updates

This month, we asked the teachers to share what distance learning looks like in each of their classes. Because we are a small, tight-knit community, we have all had to come together to learn new technology, teach each other how it works, and create the best Montessori-based distance learning program possible. Take a look at how each of the classes have handled the transition:

Room 1 – Jenny Schneider

In our Google Classroom we have a set weekly schedule of Monday, Wednesday and Friday videos and Tuesday, Thursday Zoom calls. We are studying insects. We have learned about ladybugs and butterflies. I read books in the videos and do some projects. We read *The Listening Walk* last week and then my children went on their own listening walk.

Room 2 - Renee Warner

The children have been working hard on being able to identify insects and how insects are invertebrates. I have seen pictures of the children working in their gardens, and it is so exciting to see them caring for their environment.

I want you to know how much I appreciate you and the feedback that I have received from you about Google Classroom. I know that you are busy working with maintaining routines for your children during this time. I am here for you and your children! I have provided videos to some of the Google Classroom work along with stories and song links. If there is a specific work that you would like a video of, please let me know. It has been fun to see the children during our Zoom sharing time each Friday!

Room 6 - Liz Cossairt

The children, parents and I have learned to navigate and utilize Zoom meetings and Google Classroom. I look forward to the students' arrival at our daily classroom meetings and enjoy the challenge of trying to teach and incorporate skills while still maintaining Montessori principles. The children seem happy to see one another, are responsive and adapting well to using their new computer skills. They are also learning the rules of etiquette when participating in Zoom meetings

Room 6 children took home packets of work at the beginning of social distancing that included appropriate reading comprehension workbooks, handwriting, math packets, and their journals. Since engaging in Google Classroom and Zoom I have been able to introduce and maintain lessons in Language Arts, Writing, Poetry, Science, Math and Art. Additionally, optional Read-Aloud book time is offered in the afternoons or videos of the same through the classroom. The unit that is providing continuity and tying our lessons together loosely is Animal Classification; for the rest of the year we will focus on Birds and the Backyard Biome.

Room 7 – Lara Horsting

I have set up Google Classroom with lessons on video, group on video, and Zoom meetings (4 days a week). Zoom meetings focus on lessons that I build for students in packets to pick up, facilitating handson online learning geared toward younger students.

Room 8 - Ruby Cossairt

Like everyone, we have experienced ups and downs and, most of all, we've learned an incredible amount over the past few months. It was not the curriculum I'd planned for the rest of the year, but if I've learned anything this Spring, it's that plans are (sometimes) made for throwing out.

As a staff, we have done a lot to try to recreate the physical classroom in a virtual space, all the while knowing it to be an impossible task. Even as we know it, we keep trying and in doing so we've discovered just how resilient our students truly are. The work cycle is carried forward into this new environment and I am continually amazed by my students' accomplishments, whether it be figuring out how to check their email or completing a diagram showing the different types of protists.

What else can I say about the work that we have all been doing? Well, as tempted as I am to drone on about the details or complain about technical difficulties, for today I'm content to dwell in our successes, be they large or small. Go Room 8!
